# **PREVENT**

#### **Goal: Prevent hep C transmissions**

- Expand the availability of harm reduction services and programs throughout the state.
- Promote and increase understanding of proven viral hepatitis prevention approaches.
- Enhance community awareness and education around harm reduction services.

### **DIAGNOSE**

# Goal: Diagnose all people living with hep C as early as possible

- 1. Expand access to no or low-cost guidelinebased testing.
- 2. Improve diagnosis in primary care settings
- Promote testing among high-priority populations and increase services at nontraditional service locations.
- 4. Enhance community awareness about the importance of testing, available services, and diagnostic outcomes.

### **TREAT**

# Goal: Treat all people with hep C rapidly and effectively

- 1. Connect people to medical treatment as rapidly as possible and in accordance with best practices.
- 2. Ensure that everyone living with hep C in Arizona can receive and complete treatment
- 3. Expand re-engagement opportunities for people who are out of care.
- 4. Enhance community awareness about the importance of available services and diagnostic outcomes.

# RESPOND

# Goal: Respond to community needs and quickly address potential outbreaks

- 1. Enhance public health surveillance, monitoring, evaluation, and dissemination.
- 2. Improve public health system-level capacity to track and share info on elimination outcomes.
- 3. Strengthen capacity to identify potential outbreaks and improve collaborative action.

# **FOUNDATIONAL**

#### Goal: Create a landscape that supports foundational strategies that are conducive to hep C elimination

- 1. Amplify the voices of people with lived experience and decrease barriers through advocacy.
- 2. Grow the capacity of the healthcare workforce to effectively identify, diagnose, and provide compassionate holistic care.
- 3. Fill gaps throughout the continuum of care by supporting stigma reduction, education, and patient navigation.
- 4. Encourage evidence-based interventions and micro-elimination strategies to increase and improve access to care for all.

# HEP C ELIMINATION STRATEGY PROJECT IDEAS



### **PREVENT**

#### **Hep Free AZ Projects**

 Creation of a Social Media Toolkit with examples community partners can use to educate and raise awareness around harm reduction and hepatitis C.

#### **Examples**

- <u>Caring Ambassadors Storytelling Programs</u> (i.e. Hepsie the Wonder Liver, Story Corner, "Give Hep C a Face and a Voice" initiative)
- HepConnect Initiative in Greater Appalachia -Multi-state initiative to address intersecting opioid and HCV crisis through evidence based solutions and community partnerships

# **DIAGNOSE**

#### **Hep Free AZ Projects**

Implementation of a Hep C Service
Directory/Interactive Map of Services for prevention, testing and treatment.

#### **Examples**

- <u>Australia TEMPO Study</u> Single-visit test and treat model for hep C at peer-led SSP
- <u>Victoria Cool Aid Society Housing Program</u> -Nurse-led peer testing and navigation efforts within supportive housing site in Canada

# TREAT

#### **Hep Free AZ Projects**

 Enhanced collaboration with AHCCCS to update online policies and formulary regarding PA removal.

#### **Examples**

- Project Echo
- Netflix Subscription Model for HCV DAAs in Louisiana, Washington, and Michigan
  - Unrestricted DAA access; no cap on treatment numbers; cap on expenditure
  - Partnership approach: government, community, clinical, academic reps

# RESPOND

#### **Hep Free AZ Projects**

- Creation of an annual statewide hep C surveillance report.
- Creation of a research page on HIVAZ.org to showcase local HCV data and projects.

#### **Examples**

- NYC Open Hepatitis C Surveillance Registry
- Outbreak Planning

### **FOUNDATIONAL**

#### **Hep Free AZ Projects**

- Development of a web-based version of the hepatitis C elimination plan.
- Development of a public facing Hep Free AZ Membership Directory for those who opt-in to sharing their information.
- A Gubernatorial Proclamation for Hepatitis Awareness month, or National Hepatitis Testing Day.
- Development of a Hep C Webinar Series (AZ-specific, possible CME or CE) incorporating Executive Committee Members, or persons recommended by Members.
- Enhanced engagement with new groups across the state to improve access to hep C care.
- Creation of a Hep Free AZ Leadership Program for persons with lived experience.
